

Academic Integrity Statement

Statement on Communicating Across the Curriculum

Instruction in studio art/art history provides opportunities for students to use reflective, critical thinking and writing and communication skills they can apply across the entire curriculum.

Disability Support Services

Molloy College is in compliance with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and offers "reasonable accommodations" to currently enrolled students who present a documented disability. Comprehensive documentation from a qualified professional must be provided. Documentation can be no more than three years old. A list of acceptable documentation can be obtained from the Disabilities Office.

Students who desire accommodations must submit appropriate documentations of their disability to the Coordinator of the DSS Office. Once the documentation has been reviewed and accepted, the student will meet with the Coordinator for an "intake interview" at which time appropriate accommodations will be discussed.

At the start of each new semester, the student participating in the program will submit his/her schedule to the DSS Office. A confidential letter will be provided to the student for each faculty member on the schedule, noting the necessary academic accommodations. Both the student and the Coordinator will sign these letters and the student will be responsible for distributing the letters and discussing their accommodations with their professors. Please note: the nature of the disability does not have to be discussed with a professor, only accommodations. However, without a letter from the DSS Office, accommodations cannot be provided.
